Description:	Anastasia State Park comprises more than 1,600 acres of beaches, tidal
	marshes, maritime hammocks, and ancient sand dunes. There is an
	abundance of wildlife found in the various habitats. The park is located on
	The Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail.
	The park is an important migratory stopover on the eastern flyway for
	migrating birds. It is also an important nesting habitat for Least Terns,
	Wilson's Plovers, and Black Skimmers. The park has been designated an
	Important Birding Area by the National Audubon Society.

Other Information:	Guided bird walks offered monthly
Level of Difficulty:	Four miles of pristine beaches are accessible via a boardwalk and matting
	laid on sand. There is a loop trail that goes through the ancient sand dunes
	and maritime hammock that is mostly flat but contains some uneven
	terrain and some hills or stairs.
Species:	Shorebirds include Laughing Gulls, Least Terns, Black Skimmers, Royal
	Terns, Sandwich Terns, Ruddy Turnstones, and more. Wading birds can be
	seen in the salt marsh along Salt Run and include the Great Blue Heron,
	Tricolor Heron, Wood Stork and Roseate Spoonbills. Osprey, Bald Eagles
	and owls can be seen flying high above or resting in the tree tops. Song
	birds can be found in the maritime hammock and include warblers,
	cardinals, robins, woodpeckers and painted buntings. Nesting birds include
	Least Terns, Wilson's Plovers, and Black Skimmers.
