


About Us




Director Elections



Treasurer's Report – Financial Overview 2

• Fiscal Year 8/1/2023 – 7/31/2024

- Revenue = \$16,969 (\$10,576 donations; \$6,393 membership fees)
- Expenditures = \$47,138 (\$3,150 donations/grants; \$9,272 admin cost; \$34,716 project)
- Fiscal Year to Date 8/1/2024 3/31/2025
 - Revenue = \$7,815 (\$3,190 donations/grants; \$4,625 membership fees)
 - Expenditures = \$8,573 (\$417 donations/grants; \$7,740 admin cost; \$416 project)

Treasurer's Report – Financial Overview 3

Audit results (thanks to **Reesa Fawcett**)

- 2023 audit recommendation to adopt a balance sheet & fiscal controls for unplanned expenditure have been implemented
- The 2024 audit was completed 4/6/2025 with no issues
- Recommendation: Establish a minimum cash balance year-over-year to ensure continued operation






Native Plant Committee

- Plants for Birds Chair Laurie Gilmore leads this Committee.
- The St. Augustine Audubon Native Plant Garden was installed in April 2024.





Garden Facts

- It took two years to design and permit the garden - including archeological and architectural review before final City Commission approval.
- Installation cost: Approximately \$35,000.
- Construction required new topsoil to ensure that no plantings disturbed more than 3 inches (depth) of the pre-existing topsoil to avoid site-specific archeological review.

Garden Facts

- We developed a wide, shallow mound surrounded by a native coquina rock retaining wall to hold the new soil in place.
- The mound and coquina retaining wall allowed us to plant over 25 native species without breaking more than 3 inches of ground.
- Outside the coquina retaining wall, Sunshine Mimosa was installed as ground cover for its durability because the garden is located in a much-visited area.
- We also installed an interpretative sign for the garden and installed individual plant identification signs with QR codes for the specific species we installed.



Native Plant Committee

- 9 volunteers maintain the garden (including Bill Bowden, who mows) and the list keeps growing!
- City officials are delighted at how well the Garden Team is maintaining the garden.
- This team also holds public events at the garden for the SJRA.



Native Plant Committee

- Held our first open house for the garden in March.
- A second open house is scheduled for May 1 from 9-11:00 AM.



Our CLI Student Elizabeth Cernik

- Elizabeth (Liz) Cernik is a graduating senior at Flagler College (biology major).
- Several months ago, she approached us about volunteering.
- We were able to get her enrolled in Audubon Florida's "Conservation Leadership Initiative" program.
- Liz's project was monitoring and maintaining the 20 Bluebird Boxes we installed at the Welaka Hatchery.
- Liz is the new Shorebird Steward Monitor for St. Johns County this summer!

Monitoring Eastern Bluebirds

Creation of Bluebird trails

- Eastern bluebird populations decreased 90% between the 1920's and 1990's
- Introduced, invasive house sparrows outcompete Bluebirds
- Use of pesticide DDT was outright killing eastern bluebirds
- Solution?
- Blue bird trails were created, and successfully restored bluebird populations


Blue bird nesting

- - Nest building starts in February
- Females build a majority of the nests
- One week after nest building is complete, the female lays eggs
- One clutch contains on average 5 eggs
- - 13-16 days after the female lays eggs, they hatch
- Chicks fledge after about 17-21 days after hatching



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
